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The God Who Curses

Deuteronomy 27:9-26; 28:15-68

Purpose: To understand that God is also a Holy God who does not tolerate sin. Consequently, He warns (with curses) His people to not stray, ultimately providing salvation through His Son who bore the curse for us.

Read Deut 27:9-26 and 28:15-19.

What are some of the ways people view God? Where do people get their beliefs from? Is it true that people's understanding of God often reflects values they prefer?

Why is God's love stressed so much in the church today? Do you think it is stressed too much?

Charles Spurgeon said, "God must punish sin: if he did not, he would undeify himself." What does Spurgeon mean? What does it mean that God is holy? What is the potential result if the church fails to stress God's holiness? How does God's holiness relate to our need for holiness?

Why is it merciful (loving) for God to threatened His people with curses? Do the authors of the New Testament warn their readers in a similar manner? (see 1 Cor 10:12; Phil 2:12; Heb 2:1; 3:12). What is the ultimate purpose of such threats or warnings?

Paul tells us in Galatians 3:10-13 that Christ became a curse for us. What does that mean?

Read Deuteronomy 27:9-10.

Notice that obedience was expected as a result of being God's people. Why is this order important? (i.e., covenantal relationship precedes obedience)? What is at stake if we get that order wrong? (i.e., thinking that obedience is needed in order to establish a relationship with God).

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
