

# NWC Questions

for Personal Study and Small Groups 12/2/12

## Matthew 1.1-17

**Focus:** *to help us trust God's unlikely sovereign work in bringing Jesus as the seed of Abraham, the son of David, the Messiah and to embrace our role in sharing this good news.*

Have you ever done genealogy research? What did you learn? Why would this information have been important for first century Jews to know about Jesus?

Read 1.1-17. What is your first reaction to a passage like this? How did the sermon and your personal study of this passage change that perception?

List the names of the women included. This was unusual to have women such as this in a genealogy! Share what you know about each women's story (bonus points for reading relevant scriptures!). Why do you think their names were included?

Read about Manasseh's legacy in 2 Kings 21.1-3, 6, 9, 16. Why would someone this evil be included in Jesus' genealogy?

Read Gen. 12.3; 22.16-18 and 2 Sam. 7.12, 13 to glean what the importance is of connecting Jesus to both Abraham and David?

What does this passage teach us about God and the people He uses? If you were to find yourself in this genealogy somewhere, where would it be? What truths do you glean from this seemingly "skippable" passage that are an encouragement to you?
